Along the coast, storm surge is often the greatest threat to life and property from a hurricane. In the past, large death tolls have resulted from the rise of the ocean.

What is storm surge?

Storm surge, the temporary rise in sea level beneath a storm, becomes dangerous when the storm - typically a hurricane or other tropical storm - reaches land.

While the powerful, destructive wind speeds of an approaching cyclone are used to estimate the storm's category, storm surge is often the greatest threat to both.

A storm surge is a rise in sea level that occurs during tropical cyclones, intense storms also known as typhoons or hurricanes. The storms produce strong winds.

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Topography of the land surface is another important element in storm surge extent. Several houses were either damaged beyond repair or washed off their foundations and destroyed. Storm tide is the total observed seawater level during a storm, which is the combination of storm surge and astronomical tide. Summary page for article Simpson, R.
